Art

Art: K-2 / Period 5 / ND / 1T

This is a foundation art class that will focus on the elements and techniques of art. In this first trimester, student artwork will be based on what they learn about Aegean, Greek and Etruscan art. Students will explore both two-dimensional and three-dimensional artwork. A syllabus will be sent home with supplementary information about the styles, techniques and art terms that we discuss in class. All artwork will remain in class until the last class when students can take their portfolios home. Students will need to wear old clothing or an apron as some supplies will not wash out of clothing. All art materials will be supplied; there is a \$5.00 material fee.

Art: 3-5 / Period 4 / ND / 1T

This is a foundation art class that will focus on the elements and techniques of art. In this first trimester, student artwork will be based on what they learn about art along the Silk Road. Students will work with textiles, clay and paint. A syllabus will be sent home with supplementary information about the areas, styles, techniques and art terms that we discuss in class. All artwork will remain in class until the last class when students can take their portfolios home. Students will need to wear old clothing or an apron as some supplies will not wash out of clothing. All art materials will be supplied; there is a \$5.00 material fee.

Art: 6-8 / Period 7 / ND / 1T

This art class will focus on the techniques of North American Indian Tribes and Inuit art and artists. Students will work with a wide range of media to create original designs based on studied art. A syllabus will be sent home with supplementary information about the styles, techniques and history of what we discuss in class. All artwork will remain in class until the last class when students can take their portfolios home. Students will need to wear old clothing or an apron as some supplies will not wash out of clothing. All art materials will be supplied; there is a \$5.00 material fee.

Art: 9-12 / Period 3 / ND / 1T

This fine arts class will focus on the art and techniques found along the Silk Road and surrounding area. Students will examine works of art and use the styles and techniques to create original works of their own. A syllabus will be sent home with supplementary information about the styles, techniques and history of what we discuss in class. There may be some light homework. All artwork will remain in class until the last class when students can take their portfolios home. Students will need to wear old clothing or an apron as some supplies will not wash out of clothing. All art materials will be supplied; there is a \$5.00 material fee.

Students will use the five basic elements of shape and focus on drawing what they see. This first trimester students will focus on the lights and darks of Chiaroscuro and Renaissance style drawings. There will be 2-3 hours of homework per week. Students may take their portfolios home on the last day of class. This is an ungraded class unless parents request otherwise before the first class.

Electives

Logic: 9-12 / Period 5 / KW / 1T

This is an introductory course to the "<u>Art of Argument</u>," by Aaron Larsen, which will help your student(s) to become more adept at critically thinking through issues they may face. By peering into the other side of the coin, our young people will become better equipped to counter wrong ideas when confronted and be able to recognize a "moot" point when they hear it. Relevance, Presumption, and Clarity will be explored for those taking all three trimesters as we work through 32 lessons of logic. The first trimester will cover an Introduction to Logic, Fallacies of Relevance, *Ad Fontem* arguments, (which are arguments against the source,) and about halfway through Appeals to Emotion, at the rate of approximately 7 pages of the text per week. There will be vocabulary, quizzes and tests throughout the year. A final grade will be given based upon the material covered each trimester. Why not give Logic a try?

English

Grammar 6: 5-7 / Period 4 / KW / 1T

This is Shurley English Homeschooling Grammar Level 6. The class will cover approximately one chapter per week. Class time will be spent learning and reinforcing grammar concepts with oral recitation. Students will learn basic editing and writing skills. Writing assignments will reinforce learned concepts. Weekly homework will include a take home test, writing assignments and brief exercises to reinforce what is learned during class. Homework will be due at the start of class each week.

Literature: 3-5 / Period 2 / SZ / 1T

It's all about dogs. Man's best friend. **"Shiloh" by Phyllis Naylor**, **"Sounder" by William H. Armstrong**, and **"Where the Red Fern Grows" by Wilson Rawls** will be the books read this trimester. Students will learn and apply basic literature terms (ex. = characters, theme, climax, plot). Students will have homework for the class and the class will be graded.

Literature: 6-8 / Period 1 / ND / 1T

The goal of this class is to help intermediate students discern and understand literature and literary devices such as plot, themes, and character. In this first trimester students will read novels, a play, and

short stories about journeys and community: *Adventures of Tom Sawyer* by Mark Twain, *Things Fall Apart* by Chinua Achebe, *Armageddon Summer* by Jane Yolen and Bruce Coville and *The Importance of Being Earnest* by Oscar Wilde. We will approach the literature within a Christian worldview. The final grade will be based on class participation, study questions, weekly quizzes, one essay and final exam. Reading load will be about 100-145 pages per week.

Modern Literature I—Boats, Trains, and Automobiles: Toward American Literature: 9-12 / Period 4 / AD / 1T

This is the first of three courses that will cover several classic works of modern literature as part of the fourth year of a four-year sequence of college preparatory literature courses. It is recommended that students also take the "Modern History I" course in order to understand the interplay of literature with other philosophical, religious, and cultural currents. The final grade will be based on class participation, completion of weekly study questions and quizzes, three essays, and a final exam. Poetry: 6-9 / Period 6 / KW / 1T

This course covers 30 lessons about poetry over the three trimesters. You will be expected to have the homework completed each week, so that you will have time to practice writing during the class hour. The textbook is <u>The Grammar of Poetry</u> by Matt Whitling. This course covers the technical grammar of poetry while the class time will be spent writing and enjoying one another's poems. This course does offer a final exam as well. There will NOT be a grade issued for the poems, but the homework worksheets and the final will make up the grade for this course.

ALL Institute for Excellence in Writing (IEW) courses will cover creative, expository, and descriptive writing. Course materials may all be purchased from the Institute for Excellence in Writing website: <u>www.excellenceinwriting.com</u>. (Go to Products, Writing, Student Writing Intensive, and find Notebook and Packet only.) All courses require the use of the <u>KEY WORD OUTLINE</u> for gathering facts used in assignments. It is highly recommended that students enroll for all 3 trimesters of this course. ALL FINAL assignments are to be in INK, whether they are typed or handwritten. <u>ALL weekly assignments are due by 5:00 p.m. via email, on the Monday after the lesson,</u> unless other arrangements have been made with the instructor. Plagiarism will NOT be tolerated.

Level A Writing – Beginning: 3-5 / Period 3 / KW / 1T

This course covers the basic introduction and reinforcement of the Institute for Excellence in Writing (IEW) program. **Please read the general statement for ALL IEW courses, above.** Beginning with the Key Word Outline, the students learn how to gather information from source texts. Then, they learn the PROCESS for transforming those facts into meaningful reports, stories, and essays. Students enrolled in this course should understand what a complete sentence is and have had some writing

experiences. Reluctant writers welcome! Weekly assignments are from 1-5 paragraphs long, and are due by 5:00 p.m. the Monday after the assignment is given. This will be a graded course.

Level B Writing – Intermediate: 6-8 / Period 2 / KW / 1T

This course covers much of the same material as the Level C High School course, but at a slower pace. There will be weekly creative, descriptive and expository writing assignments each week. We will work from the simple to the more complex, expanding vocabulary and sentence structures. Texts used are age appropriate for this level. This will be a graded course. **Please read the general statement for ALL IEW courses, above.**

LEVEL C Writing–Advanced: 9-12 / Period 1 / KW / 1T

This course is for the general student and will provide instruction in the written word. Assignments cover the <u>IEW Level C Student Intensive</u> course. **Please read the general statement for ALL IEW courses, above.** If students struggle with some of the Basic English principles, this course will help them to master those concepts. This is NOT a grammar course, but grammatical principles will be introduced. Spelling is the responsibility of the student. Weekly assignments include creative, descriptive, and expository writing. There will be a grade given at the end of this trimester. It is highly recommended that students take this course for all 3 trimesters to fully develop the necessary skills

for writing.

GEOGRAPHY

Geography: 3-5 / Period 5 / SZ / 1T

In this trimester students will learn to locate the continents and oceans. They will study the following land areas: Canada, Mexico, the Caribbean Islands, the Arctic and Antarctica. Along with learning where these areas are, students will learn about their culture and land forms. Students should have access to an atlas. There will be some research homework (students will research and present facts about a Canadian providence and an island). This course will be graded.

History/U. S. Government

Modern History I: 5-8 / Period 3 / PW / 1T

This is the first of three courses that will provide an introductory survey of the modern world as part of a four-year sequence in world history. This world history survey is designed to prepare students for the high school history and literature classes.

This class, "The Age of Revolutions," will introduce students to the period, 1789-1870. The student's primary work will be learning how to use online resources to identify key people, events, and places.

The information gathered during the week will be analyzed and discussed in class to show how it all fits together.

The final grade will be based on class participation, completion of weekly assignments, and a final exam.

Modern History I/American History II – Slavery and the Civil War: 9-12 / Period 1 / PW / 1T

This is the first of three courses that will cover several classic works of modern history as part of a four-year sequence of college preparatory history classes. The course dovetails with the "Modern Literature I" course in order to help students understand the interplay of literature, politics, religion, and culture. The instructors of the two courses confer regularly in order to help students connect history and literature within a Christian worldview. The final grade will be based on class participation, completion of study questions, essay, and a final exam.

This course is designed to introduce students to the political, social and religious issues surrounding slavery that resulted in the Civil War. Beyond the two texts listed below, students will read a number of essays, speeches, and debates from a variety of sources from the 1850s and 1860s that discuss slavery and the coming of the Civil War.

[Please note: this course could be considered "U.S. Government" or "U.S. History" (U.S. History I was taught last year)]

Language

Spanish A: 7-8 / Period 4 / SD / 1T

This 3 trimester course is a gentle introduction to Spanish language, taught toward junior high level students. Recommended for 7th and 8th graders; other grade levels may be admitted upon instructor approval. The course focuses on vocabulary of everyday life, the present tense of verbs, and culture; listening, reading, writing, and speaking the language will be practiced. If taken in sequence with "Spanish B" next year, the two courses together are the equivalent of high school Spanish I, after which students may enroll in Spanish II. Students must purchase a workbook, available online: <u>Spanish is Fun, Book 1, Fifth Edition</u>

Spanish I Class and Lab: 8-12 / Periods 5 and 6 / SD / 1T

This is a 3 trimester course, the first year of high school Spanish. This course focuses on cognate vocabulary, proper pronunciation, vocabulary of family, school, everyday activities, professions,

seasons, the calendar, weather, human body, present tense of verbs, and culture. Listening, reading, writing, and speaking the language will be practiced. Lab time will consist of homework review, testing, and conversation, while class time will be devoted to vocabulary, grammar and reading. Students will purchase the text workbook, at

Spanish Conversation: 8-12 / Period 5 / SD / 1T

Prerequisite: Spanish I and instructor approval. Conversation class is designed to reinforce the vocabulary and grammar of Spanish I without advancing into Spanish II materials. This 3-trimester course is useful for a student who wants to reinforce and expand conversation skills acquired in Spanish I, or gain more practice before entering the next level of Spanish instruction. Students will work through the text *Conversaciones Contigo*, checking their homework and taking a brief quiz weekly. Students will also participate in conversation activities with multi-level Spanish students in the language lab. Students must purchase the text workbook, available online: <u>Conversaciones</u> <u>Contigo</u>

Spanish II Class and Lab: 9-12 / Periods 5 and 7 / SD / 1T

Prerequisite: Spanish I. This is a 3 trimester course, the second year of high school Spanish. The coursework is grammar intensive, continuing with present, past, future, conditional, and compound tenses; vocabulary includes nature, everyday activities, stores and shopping, professions; conversation, reading and culture will also be emphasized. Lab time will consist of homework review, conversation and testing, while class time will be devoted to vocabulary, grammar, and reading. The text can be purchased through the publisher at Spanish is Fun, Book 2 (softcover).

Students who take Spanish II and Spanish Lab are not charged for the Study Hall between them.

Advanced Spanish III/IV Class: 10-12 / Period 3 / SD / 1T

Prerequisite: Spanish II. This is a 3 trimester course, advanced high school Spanish. It is possible to enroll for this course 2 consecutive years. The coursework reviews and extends past grammar: present, past, future, conditional, and compound tenses. Vocabulary, conversation, reading and culture will also be emphasized. Field experience, volunteer activities in Spanish language settings in the community may be available. Class time will be devoted to vocabulary, grammar, reading, and conversation. MUSIC

Music: K-3 / Period 4 / SZ / 1T

Learning and practicing basic music terms are the focus in this basic music course. We will be learning

about famous composers and several basic children's songs but we will be looking at them in a new way. Learning concepts will take place by marching, clapping, rhythm sticks, and singing. This course will not be graded.

Music: 3-8 / Period 3 / SZ / 1T

This course will help the student move beyond the basics in music. We will be learning how to become a better singer, about many types of notes, time signatures and how to sight read music as a singer. We will also be learning about the Middle Ages and Renaissance Eras from a music perspective. This course will not be graded.

Science

Biology II: Human Anatomy and Physiology: 10-12 / Periods 2 and 3 / SAH / 1T

The first trimester of <u>The Human Body: Fearfully and Wonderfully Made</u> starts with a review of concepts learned in Biology I. We will then explore in depth the histology of tissues, especially of the bones and muscles. There will be readings from the text, and further study using the <u>Anatomy</u> <u>Coloring Book</u> by Kapit and Elson. At least two hours of homework will be assigned weekly, and will include coloring book exercises from the textbook. *Mandatory dissections, microscopy, and module tests will be done in the Lab section of the class.* Grades will be based on laboratory assignments and module tests. **Biology I is required, or permission of the teacher.** *Parents are encouraged to check the Study Guide Questions in preparation for the module tests. An answer sheet will be given for this*

purpose. All students taking Biology II must take the Laboratory also.

Biology II Lab: 10-12 / Periods 2 and 3 / SAH / 1T

The first trimester of Advanced Biology Laboratory Section will cover Laboratory Safety and microscope use. Drawings will be made from the microscope work, and dissections performed under supervision. All module tests will be taken during the lab period. There will be further study using the Anatomy and Physiology Coloring Book by Kapit and Elson. All students taking Biology II must take the Laboratory also.

General Science: 6-8 / Period 5 / SAH / 1T

Exploring Creation with General Science, 2nd Edition is an introduction to Science and scientific inquiry. The first trimester introduces the history of science, how to analyze and interpret experiments, applied science, archeology, geology, and paleontology. There will be about two hours of homework per week, to include reading from the text and other sources, answering questions from the text, and analysis of laboratory work done in the classroom. Grades will be based on lab work, homework assignments and chapter tests. Tests will be take-home, and are due on the following class day. Students will need a folder or notebook for handouts and lab work. There is a \$5 lab fee.

Physical Science: 8-10 / Period 7 / SAH / 1T

The first trimester of Exploring Creation with Physical Science, 2nd Edition starts with an introduction to atoms and molecules. We will explore the composition of air and the atmosphere, and then learn about the structure of water and the hydrosphere. There will be readings from the text, and from the Apologia website. Two hours of homework will be assigned weekly, with a high emphasis on lab reports. Physics: 11-12 / Period 7 / MH / 1T

Physics is a three trimester course of High School introductory physics, based on the book <u>Exploring</u> <u>Creation with Physics, 2nd Edition</u> by Dr. Jay Wile. This class is designed to prepare the student for university-level physics courses.

Please note that this book is set up for use over 32 weeks; our three trimesters have only thirty weeks, so there will be some acceleration (pun intended) in the material covered in the first trimester. Due to instructor's scheduling constraints, there will be no separate lab section.

First Trimester: Basics of motion

The first trimester begins by studying motion and Newton's Laws, covering the following topics:

- Motion in one dimension (speed, velocity and acceleration)
- Equations for one-dimensional motion (displacement, velocity, acceleration and time)
- Free fall
- Two-dimensional vectors

- Motion in two dimensions
- Newton's three laws
- Applications of Newton's second law

Most class periods will have some experiment or demonstration of the material discussed.

It is recommended that students also take the "Modern Literature II" course in order to understand the interplay of literature with other philosophical, religious, and cultural currents. The instructors of the two courses confer regularly in order to help students connect history and literature within a Christian worldview. The final grade will

be based on class participation, completion of study questions, essay, and a final exam. The object of this course is to help students understand the development of modern thought. For this reason we will be reading many texts that overtly disagree with (and indeed seek to overthrow) Christian principles. Why read these texts? If you have watched Disney movies, then you have already been indoctrinated with the principles of modernity. The texts that we will read in class will simply make explicit what modern movies, songs, TV shows, etc. take for granted – and regularly seek to inculcate. In other words, you cannot escape the material we will read in this trimester. The only question is whether you will try to understand it or not!

I strongly recommend that students who take this course continue for the third trimester – since the third trimester will provide the bulk of the discussion of how to evaluate and think about this material from a Christian standpoint.

Biology II: Human Anatomy and Physiology: 10-12 / Periods 2 and 3 / SAH / 2T

The second trimester of <u>Advanced Biology</u> continues with an overview of the skeletal system. We will then explore in depth the nervous system, both gross and central and peripheral. Our last unit will be a simple study of the endocrine system. There will be readings from the text, and further study using the <u>Anatomy Coloring Book</u> by Kapit and Elson. At least two hours of homework will be assigned weekly, and will include experiments and coloring book exercises from the textbook. Mandatory dissections, microscopy, and module tests will be done in the Lab section of the class. Grades will be based on laboratory assignments and module tests. **Biology I is required, or permission of the teacher.** *Parents are encouraged to check the Study Guide Questions in preparation for the module tests. An answer sheet will be given for this purpose.* **All students taking Biology II must take the Laboratory also.**

Grades will be based on lab work, homework assignments and chapter tests. Students will need internet access for reading assignments, research, homework and tests. Students will need a folder or notebook for handouts and lab work. There is a \$5 lab fee.

Two hours of homework will be assigned weekly, and will include experiments from the textbook. Grades will be based on laboratory assignments and module tests. **Algebra is required.** Students will be required to have a notebook or folder for laboratory reports, and access to a computer for readings. *Parents are encouraged to check the Study Guide Questions in preparation for the module tests. An answer sheet will be given for this purpose.*

Please note that this book is set up for use over 32 weeks; our three trimesters have only thirty weeks, so there will be some acceleration (pun intended) in the material covered in the first trimester. Due to instructor's scheduling constraints, there will be no separate lab section.

2nd Trimester: Motion, momentum, energy, work and waves

The second trimester completes the study of motion and its application in energy, work, momentum and waves. We will cover the following topics:

- Uniform circular motion
- Gravity
- Work and energy
- Momentum
- Periodic motion
- Waves: sound and light

Most class periods will have some experiment or demonstration of the material discussed.

The conclusion of fallacies of presumption, the fallacies of Induction and the fallacies of Clarity will be explored as we conclude working through the last 10 of these 31 lessons of logic. A final grade will be given for those students who sustained all three trimesters, and a separate grade will be given for those students who just took this trimester, covering only the material covered this term. There will be vocabulary, quizzes and tests throughout the term. Why not give Logic a try?

The Robotics Challenge course will build on the foundation of the introductory course. Students will work as a group to build, program, and test robots to complete a series of challenges. The challenges will be based on the LEGO Education Green City Challenge curriculum. Students will learn how engineering, math, and science can be applied through the use of robotic technology to solve real world problems.

This course will develop linear thinking and teamwork in problem solving. Basic computer skills are prerequisite. Experience with programming in the NXT-G Language or equivalent is necessary as all students will be required to take part in programming exercises. Experience with the LEGO building system is helpful but not a prerequisite.

Student evaluations will be based on participation, teamwork, and demonstrated understanding of the course material measured by quizzes throughout the course. Letter grades will be available upon request.

The Robotics Challenge class is on a 2-year rotation and is only offered in the 3rd trimester.

This semester, we will be workshopping monologues from Shakespeare's *The Tempest.* Students will need to purchase a copy of the play. Used editions are fine, although unmarked single-play editions with additional scholarly commentary (especially glossary) are preferred. I recommend editions by Norton

or Penguin Classics.

The final grade will be based on class participation, completion of weekly assignments, and a final exam.

The instructors of the two courses confer regularly in order to help students connect history and literature within a Christian worldview. The final grade will be based on class participation, completion of study questions, essay, and a final exam.

I strongly recommend that students take the second and third trimesters together – since the second trimester provides the bulk of the material that will be evaluated in the third trimester. To facilitate class discussion, the following editions will be *required*:

Spanish A: 7-8 / Period 4 / SD / 3T

This 3 trimester course is a gentle introduction to Spanish language, taught toward junior high level students. Recommended for 7th and 8th graders; other grade levels may be admitted upon instructor approval. The course focuses on vocabulary of everyday life, the present tense of verbs, and culture; listening, reading, writing, and speaking the language will be practiced. If taken in sequence with "Spanish B" next year, the two courses together are the equivalent of high school Spanish I, after

which students may enroll in Spanish II. Students must purchase a workbook, available online: *Spanish is Fun, Book 1, Fifth Edition*

Spanish I Class and Lab: 8-12 / Periods 5 and 6 / SD / 3T

This is a 3 trimester course, the first year of high school Spanish. This course focuses on cognate vocabulary, proper pronunciation, vocabulary of family, school, everyday activities, professions, seasons, the calendar, weather, human body, present tense of verbs, and culture. Listening, reading, writing, and speaking the language will be practiced. Lab time will consist of homework review, testing, and conversation, while class time will be devoted to vocabulary, grammar and reading. Students will purchase the text workbook, at

Spanish Conversation: 8-12 / Period 5 / SD/ 3T

Prerequisite: Spanish I and instructor approval. Conversation class is designed to reinforce the vocabulary and grammar of Spanish I without advancing into Spanish II materials. This 3-trimester course is useful for a student who wants to reinforce and expand conversation skills acquired in Spanish I, or gain more practice before entering the next level of Spanish instruction. Students will work through the text *Conversaciones Contigo*, checking their homework and taking a brief quiz weekly. Students will also participate in conversation activities with multi-level Spanish students in the language lab. Spanish II Class and Lab: 9-12 / Periods 5 and 7 / SD / 3T

Prerequisite: Spanish I. This is a 3 trimester course, the second year of high school Spanish. The coursework is grammar intensive, continuing with present, past, future, conditional, and compound tenses; vocabulary includes nature, everyday activities, stores and shopping, professions; conversation, reading and culture will also be emphasized. Lab time will consist of homework review, conversation and testing, while class time will be devoted to vocabulary, grammar, and reading. The text can be purchased through the publisher at <u>Spanish is Fun, Book 2</u> (softcover).

Students who take Spanish II and Spanish Lab are not charged for the Study Hall between them.

The coursework reviews and extends past grammar: present, past, future, conditional, and compound tenses. Vocabulary, conversation, reading and culture will also be emphasized. Field experience, volunteer activities in Spanish language settings in the community may be available. Class time will be devoted to vocabulary, grammar, reading, and conversation. Along with becoming proficient in our basic knowledge of music, we will learn songs about America and focus on American composers. This course will not be graded.

This course will help the student move beyond the basics in music. Science

Biology II: Human Anatomy and Physiology: 10-12 / Periods 2 and 3 / SAH / 3T

The third trimester of <u>Advanced Biology</u> comprises study of the major internal systems of the body. We will explore the circulatory, lymphatic, digestive, respiratory and urinary systems in turn. There will be readings from the text, and further study using the <u>Anatomy Coloring Book</u> by Kapit and Elson. At least two hours of homework will be assigned weekly, and will include experiments and coloring book exercises from the textbook. Mandatory dissections, microscopy, and module tests will be done in the Lab section of the class. Grades will be based on laboratory assignments and module tests. **Biology I is required, or permission of the teacher.** We will ask permission from the parents to perform a fingerstick to obtain blood for the blood-typing experiment. This lab is *not* mandatory. **All students taking Biology II must take the Laboratory also**.

Biology II Lab: 10-12 / Periods 2 and 3 / SAH / 3T

The third trimester of Advanced Biology Laboratory Section will conclude with dissections, especially of the heart, and microscope work. We will also perform the dissection of a fetal pig. Drawings will be made from the microscope work, and dissections performed under supervision. All module tests will be taken during the lab period. There will be further study using the Anatomy Coloring Book<u>http://www.amazon.com/Anatomy-Coloring-Book-Wynn-Kapit/dp/0805350861</u> by Kapit and Elson. **All students taking Biology II must take the Laboratory also.**

General Science: 6-8 / Period 5 / SAH / 3T

Exploring Creation with General Science, 2nd Edition will conclude with an in-depth study of the human body. We will explore all the major systems of the body (bones, muscles, metabolism, digestion, respiratory, lymphatic and nervous), and dissection demonstrations will occur in the classroom. There will be about two hours of homework per week, to include reading from the text and other sources, answering questions from the text, and analysis of laboratory work done in the classroom. Grades will be based on lab work, homework assignments and chapter tests. Students will need internet access for reading assignments, research, homework and tests. Tests will be take-home, and are due on the next class day. Students will need a folder or notebook for handouts and lab work. There is a \$5 lab fee.

Physical Science: 8-10 / Period 7 / SAH / 3T

The third trimester of <u>Exploring Creation with Physical Science</u>, 2nd Edition explores the four fundamental forces in creation, introduces the periodic table of the elements, and concludes with the nature of sound and light. There will be readings from the text, and from the Apologia website. Two hours of homework will be assigned weekly, and will include experiments from the textbook. Grades will be based on laboratory assignments and module tests. **Algebra is required**. Students will be required to have a notebook or folder for laboratory reports, and access to a computer for readings. *Parents are encouraged to check the Study Guide Questions in preparation for the module tests. An answer sheet will be given for this purpose.*

Physics: 11-12 / Period 7 / MH / 3T

Physics is a three trimester course of High School introductory physics, based on the book <u>Exploring</u> <u>Creation with Physics</u>, 2nd Edition by Dr. Jay Wile. This class is designed to prepare the scholar for university-level physics courses.

Please note that this book is set up for use over 32 weeks; our three trimesters have only thirty weeks, so there will be some acceleration (pun intended) in the material covered in the first trimester. Due to instructor's scheduling constraints, there will be no separate lab section.

Third Trimester: Optics, Electricity and Magnetism

The third trimester expands the study to cover how optical devices work, what electricity is and how it is used, and the basics of magnetism. The following topics are covered:

- Geometric optics
- Coulomb's Law
- The electric field
- Electric potential
- Capacitance
- Electric circuits
- Magnetism

Most class periods will have some experiment or demonstration of the material discussed.

Exploring Creation with Zoology I, Flying Creatures of the Fifth Day will conclude with an in-depth study of insects, including social insects, beetles, flies, true bugs, and butterflies. We will explore many interesting insects and some of their behaviors, including swarming and migration. The exercises in this trimester will be used to compile a report on an insect of the student's choice to be displayed at the Open House at the end of the year. There will be about two hours of homework per week, to include reading from the text, and answering questions from the text and classroom demonstrations. Grades will be based on homework assignments and chapter tests. Students will need a notebook for handouts and lab work.
